A Note from the Director

A year of rebuilding and rebranding

In the 2021-2022 academic year, the Global Education Office (GEO) emerged from the pandemic with a renewed and re-energized focus. Enrollments, office financials and staffing were all significantly impacted by the pandemic. GEO responded by seizing the opportunity to rebrand itself from the Study Abroad Office to the Global Education Office to better reflect the dynamism of the broader institution we serve and to rebuild our team and our programming in a more thoughtful way given the new operating environment. After nearly a full-year cessation of student mobility, the fall 2021 semester witnessed the return to normal operations which has continued since. In total, GEO served just shy of 4,000 students in 2021-2022 across all modalities and program types.

In keeping with ASU's charter to expand access to students from a wide range of socioeconomic backgrounds and our institutional culture of innovation, the Global Education Office added the Global Tech Experience to its online global learning opportunities that have allowed thousands of students who were unable to travel due to the pandemic, finances or professional and family commitments, the opportunity to engage in global education programs focused on career readiness, preparation and intercultural learning.

The diversity in online global learning programs was strong and offset decreases in mobility program enrollments. Supply chain disruptions and inflationary pressure caused by the pandemic led to higher program costs for traditional mobility programs. Combined with the uncertain economic environment for many families, this resulted in less diverse student enrollments in mobility programs than has historically been the case. As the broader economy recovers and the financials of GEO stabilize allowing us to commit more funding to scholarships, we are optimistic that we will see increases in diverse enrollments in all program modalities moving forward.

If we have learned anything from the past few years, it is that all people on this planet are deeply and profoundly connected. Participation in a global education program continues to be one of the most effective ways for students to understand these connections through their lived experience. Our students have continued to demonstrate a remarkable resilience in their pursuit of these experiences in the face of significant challenges. We could not be prouder of them.






Comparatively, ASU has a 35.5% Pell eligibility.





Traditional mobility at ASU

Program types



Faculty Directed

Faculty Directed programs are led by ASU faculty for Sun Devils, typically occurring during the summer. Students receive pre-determined ASU credit(s), and study a specific topic to expand learning beyond the classroom.



Partnership

Partnership programs are longer-term programs students can participate in, ranging from 6-18 weeks during the summer or semester. Students receive ASU credit based on course equivalencies, and receive on-site support from a partner organization.



Global Intensive Experience

Global Intensive Experiences (GIE) are the shortest program option, lasting 7-12 days over academic breaks. Students travel with ASU faculty to take a deep dive into a specific topic. GIEs can also be a part of a semester course at ASU.



Exchange

Exchange programs are the most traditional and immersive study abroad experience. Students are part of a reciprocal exchange program and spend a semester abroad enrolled at a local university. Incoming exchange students spend a semester at ASU.

What is traditional mobility?

Traditional mobility programs represent what most people think of as study abroad. Intentionally designed and carefully curated, GEO facilitates 300+ programs to meet the needs of every ASU student. Programs come in all shapes and sizes, and include study abroad, domestic study away, internships, research and service learning.





Academic level




Study abroad by region





What are online global learning programs?


The ASU Global Education Office offered online global learning programs starting in 2020, and student interest continues. Online global learning programs open up global education experiences as an option for more ASU students regardless of their background.


As seen in the following data, online global learning programs are a popular global learning option for a more diverse group of students than traditional mobility. It limits the barriers and obstacles to a global education experience, to allow more students to participate.

The programs are designed to be careerreadiness tools. Students can participate in remote global internships with companies worldwide to gain hands-on international work experience or join skill-based learning courses to support student's future careers. 1,211








Online global learning programs

International Travel Registration System

The Global Education Office manages ASU's International Travel Registration System, providing support to ASU faculty, staff and students who travel outside the United States for a variety of ASU-related international activities. These activities include: participation in a conference, athletic competitions, any travel in which an ASU student receives credit or is with an ASU student organization.

Registered travelers have access to GEO's travel intelligence resources, international insurance policy and 24/7 emergency support – just like participants in GEO programs.


